The average monthly household expenditure (in HK\$) of these groups during the base period (i.e. Oct 2014-Sep 2015) were \$5,500-\$24,499, \$24,500-\$44,499 and \$44,500-\$89,999 respectively. Taking into account the impact of price changes since the base period, the monthly household expenditure ranges of the CPI(A), CPI(B) and CPI(C) adjusted to the price level of 2018 are broadly equivalent to \$6,000-\$26,400, \$26,400-\$47,600 and \$47,600-\$96,100 respectively, and that of the Composite CPI is broadly equivalent to \$6,000-\$96,100. The Composite CPI is compiled based on the overall expenditure patterns of all these households taken together.




