In practice, discrepancies between the credit and debit entries may however occur for various reasons as the data are collected from different sources. 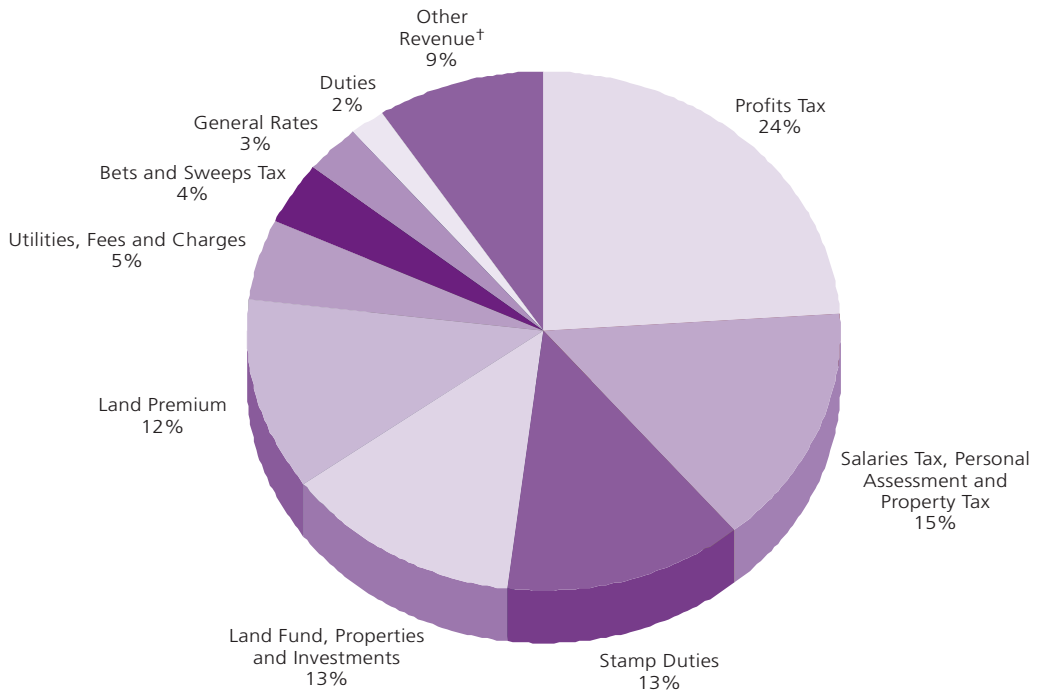

Public Expenditure by Policy Area Group

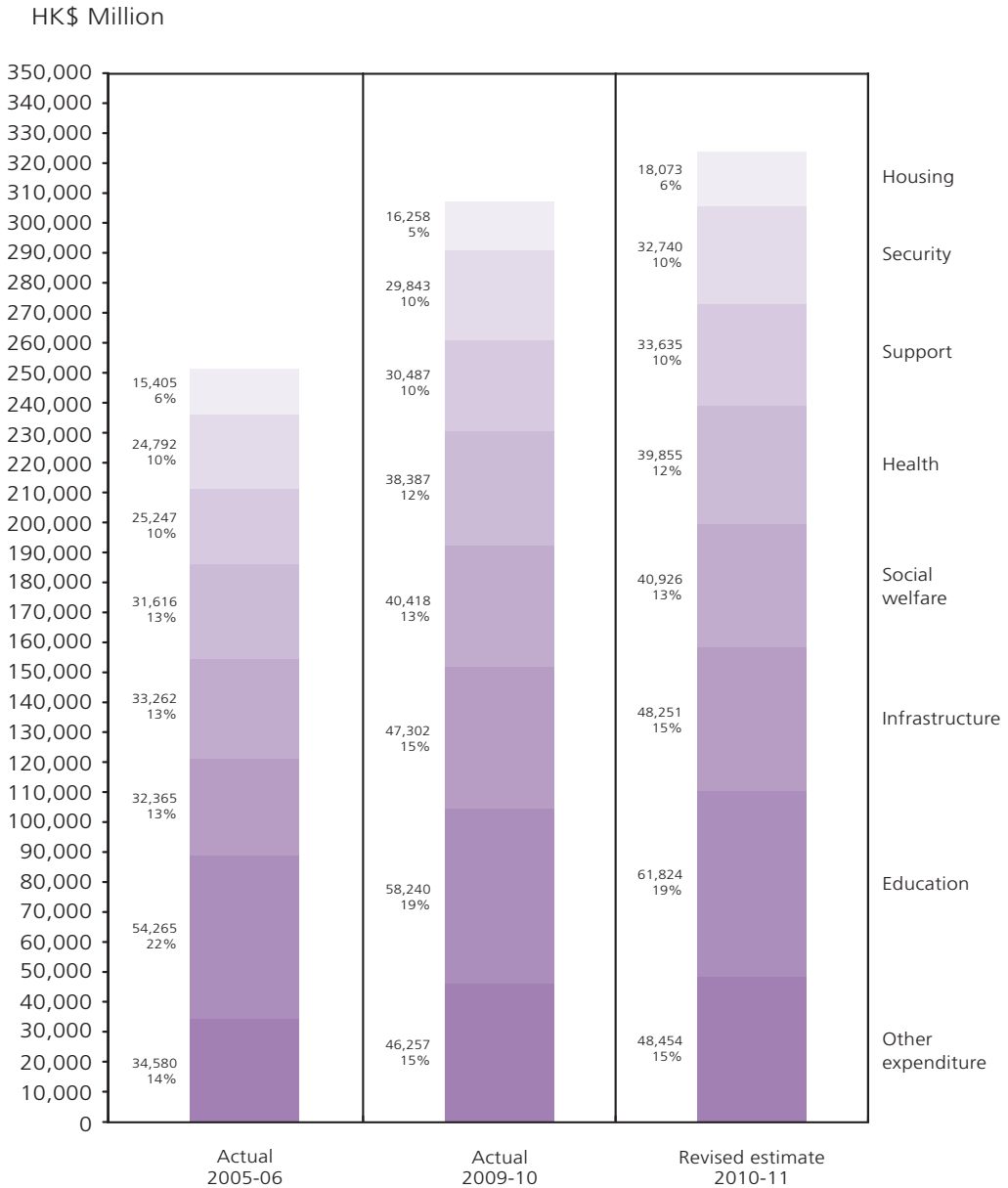
